2,300 BY MAY 23 CAMPAIGN

ASLA National is requesting the ASLA Members, Associates, Affiliates etc. send letters or e-mails to their congressional representatives in support of the Urban Revitalization and Livable Communities Act by May 23, 2010. The legislation would provide grants (HUD) to help communities build or revitalize more than 2,300 parks and recreation centers every year. Requiring a local government match, the bill would provide \$445 million to projects that connect children to the outdoors, increase physical activity, link to public transportation, and contain safe biking and walking routes.

I think everyone agrees that urban parks (and parks in general) provide significant economic, social and environmental benefits to everyone in the community. Parks just aren't pretty places-

WASLA Executive Committee

The Committee has been busy the past month with gathering information on existing classes and seminars throughout the state, reviewing the draft rules regarding continuing education per the new Landscape Architect Practice Act and understanding accreditation requirements for providers of education classes. WASLA hosted Ray Freeman's three-day seminar on CLARB's Section E, Grading and Drainage for the LARE. 24 people attended the intensive sessions and most has very positive opinions of the quality of the seminar.

We have been meeting with representatives the University of Washington Continuing Education, UW and WSU Landscape Architecture Departments and the University of Washington Botanical Garden to discuss continuing education offerings. We are currently compiling a list of providers of relevant classes from which landscape architects could use to acquire their necessary Continuing Education/Professional Development Hours to renew their license.

We are currently looking into the requirements for WASLA to become an approved provider of continuing education classes and programs through the Landscape Architecture Continuing Education System. LA CES is a collaboration of the American Society of Landscape Architects, Canadian Society of Landscape Architects, Council of Educators in Landscape Architecture, Council of Landscape Architectural Registration Boards, Landscape Architectural Accreditation Board, and Landscape Architecture Foundation.

LA CES establishes, maintains, and enforces standards for evaluating professional development and continuing education programs for landscape architects. Continuing education has never been more important for professionals; it is needed to stay up to date in the profession, to develop new areas of expertise, and is mandated for maintaining licensure in many jurisdictions. LA CES guides professionals in identifying courses that are appropriate for landscape architects and are offered by legitimate organizations that have controls and processes in place to monitor quality and track attendance.

We are actively recruiting committee members who are interested in the professional development of landscape

WASLA STUDENT AWARDS-WSU

The WSU landscape architecture department hosted the WASLA Jury on April 15th and 16th. Jury members included ASLA National President Elect John Mueller, WASLA President Kellye Hilde, Secretary Katie Bang, East Side Member at Large Craig Anderson, and Adjunct Faculty Member Suzanne Snowden. Criteria for the jury included a clear understanding of project goals, design solution, communication of process, and technical ability. Overall the jury was very impressed and highly encouraged by the quality of work and the level of thought presented by the students. Fifth year senior Alex Mann presented his senior project entitled "Produce, Place, Patterns: Finding a Place-Based Pattern Language through Bioregionalism, Rhizomic Association, and Food" and was given an ASLA Honor Award from the jury and the recommendation to present at the national level. Hugh Severs, also a fifth year senior, presented his project entitled 'The Green Way to Stimulation' and was awarded an ALSA Merit Award for the breadth of work, the depth of research, and the quality of design. Junior awards included a WASLA Honor Award for the Water Wise Garden designed by Josh Silva and Lauren Stout. The design will be implemented as the third phase of the student gardens that are constructed by the students in LA 367. Many sophomore awards were also presented. The jury was very impressed with the sophomore class's technical abilities with grading and their passion for design. The students were fortunate to have John Mueller, ASLA National President Elect in attendance. He encouraged the students to move forward with their passion for landscape architecture and spoke to the key role that landscape architects will play in the future world of green design. WASLA TRUSTEES REPORT ASLA MID-YEAR MEETING (4/30/10-5/01/10)

The following Trustees Report (summary) is based on the recently concluded ASLA Mid-Year Meeting. If there are any questions, please contact me at don_benson@urscorp.com or 206-438-2027.

1. Executive Offices/Administration

LA Magazine now has a new editor, Bradford McKee. Brad is a talented writer and editor and was selected (by ASLA panel) over a number of other candidates. The interview process included oral interviews and written responses to questions.

Four positions were or are being filled after finances improved in 2009. These are legislative analyst, marketing manager, accounting technician and LAM editor.

This year's EXPO (Annual Meeting) is tracking ahead of 2009 and is at almost 85% of their goal. LA Magazine advertising sales are at 75% of their goal for the year.

2. Finance and Building Operations

Year 2009 finished in the black after a number of cost-cutting measures (including staff reductions, furloughs, and deferred maintenance activities, etc.) along with improvement in the Stock Market for long term investments. ASLA's net assets increased by approximately \$985,000.

Building Operation issues are to replace two heat pumps (deferred from 2008) and increase sustainability of building operations. Other deferred reviews and/or upgrades will be

undertaken subject to available funds.

An audit was conducted at year's end. A couple of recommendations were made to improve operations but the audit found nothing significant.

3. Government Affairs

ASLA is continually tracking bills in Congress, the states and DC. ASLA monitors bills that related to business issues (procurement, liability etc.) and policy issues (stormwater management, smart growth, transportation, sustainable design, etc.).

The ASLA Advocacy Network continues to be a valuable tool-very easy to use. I encourage all members to take just a couple of minutes when advocacy alerts are sent to members by ASLA National and hit the Take Action button, follow the prompts and send the messages to your legislators.

ASLA is currently championing two pieces of legislation-Urban Revitalization and Livable Communities Act (HR 3734) and the Green Infrastructure for Clean Water Act (HR 4202). Trustees and Chapter Presidents visited Senators and Representatives to encourage them to sponsor, co-sponsor or support legislation. HR 3734 would provide grants (HUD) to local communities to create new and rehabilitate/maintain existing community parks and recreational facilities across the country. HR 4202 would provide grants (EPA) to states and localities to plan and design green infrastructure projects to help manage water quality and quantity across the nation. ASLA is now seeking sponsors of the legislation in the Senate. ASLA staff also worked with Congressman Steve Cohan (TN) to introduce House Concurrent Resolution No. 240 designating the 4th week of April (Landscape Architecture Month) as National Streetscaping Week. Landscape Architects are specifically mentioned in the resolution.

ASLA's campaign for 50 states by 2010 licensure efforts reports further success. Two additional states (Wisconsin and Vermont)

now have Practice Acts. Only Illinois, Massachusetts and Maine now have Title Acts only.

4. Public Relations and Communications

ASLA launched a new website "Designing our Future: Sustainable Landscape." The goal is to educate a general audience on exactly what makes a sustainable landscape, the benefits of sustainable landscape design, as well as introducing what landscape architects create. An internet outreach campaign has started through Twitter, the Dirt Blog, Facebook, LinkedIn and Land On-Line. Land On-Line and the Dirt have grown significantly in popularity over the years.

In early 2010, nearly 200 stories in print, television, radio and other on-line media mentioned Landscape Architects. A press release for the Quarterly Business Survey has been prepared.

5. Member and Chapter Services

Membership has increased by about 1% from year-end 2009. Membership in some areas of the country is still declining while in other areas it has increased. However, in most areas, membership has stabilized over the past year.

A new student representative, Barbara Nazarewicz from UC-Davis was elected for the 2010-2011 term.

There were 5 chapter visits in the 1st quarter. More are planned as the budget allows. Almost all Chapters (including WA) participated in LA Month activities in April.

A new class of Fellows (5 from WA) has been nominated and will

be selected in the 2nd quarter.

6. Publishing and Resource Development

Digital subscriptions to Landscape Architecture Magazine grew during the 1st quarter. Advertising revenues are on track for the year.

Annual Meeting/EXPO contracts for this year's annual meeting in Washington, D.C. have grown significantly and are ahead of the pace for last year.

There were a record number of Professional Award submittals this year (650). Winners should be announced soon.

Membership telemarketing helped reinstate more than 400 elapsed members.

7. Professional Practice and Information Technology

The Sustainable Sites Initiative (SSI) received over 350 applications for the Pilot Project Program including several international projects. A number of SSI presentations were given throughout last year to educate many about SSI and what is hope to be accomplished.

The Board of Trustees, in one of our breakout sessions, reviewed and listed critical issues that may be facing the profession in the next few years. This collective brainstorming was given to ASLA National staff and the ASLA Executive Committee to help with their strategic planning.

8. Education and Academic Affairs

The LA Continuing Education System (LACES) has been growing, receiving several new applications this year. The Committee on Education is reviewing data collected by CELA (Council of Educators in LA) in the Landscape Information System to make suggestions and recommendations on how data can benefit the profession. The Landscape Architecture Accreditation Board (LAAB) reviewed 8 applications for reaccreditation and one application for initial accreditation.

9. Actions/Votes at Trustee Meeting

Motion to Approve (and approval) of the 2009 Audit Committee Report

Motion to Approve (and approval) of Dues Increase for 2011-2012. This will be \$9(3%) increase for Members and Affiliates (no increase for Associates and Students). There is a periodic review of dues that is done in correspondence with the Consumer Price Index and it was determined the proposed increase was consistent with the CPI. The main reason is so that ASLA member programs can be maintained at the current level to reduce the likelihood of future reductions in service.

Motion to Approve (and approval) of Public Policy Amendments for Universal Design and Public Lands and Forests. This was done to catch up with or align policies with the Millennium Ecosystem Assessment Policies.

New ASLA Vice-Presidents were elected for Membership, Finance and Professional Practice. These will be announced soon by ASLA. ASLA President-Elect nominees (Brian Dougherty, FASLA and Susan Hatchell, FASLA) gave presentations to the Board. An election ballot will be sent soon to members for voting. ASLA Award nominees were also voted on by the Board. Winners will be announced by ASLA soon.

WHAT IF YOU COULD FEED WALLABIES IN DOWNTOWN SEATTLE?

Have you noticed how many lots have been left empty or partially developed due to the stalled economy? These vacant project sites are all around us. Unattractive and unbecoming of our city, we pass by them every day: empty holes, barren plains of gravel, voids in the city fabric. How can we convert these eyesores to opportunities?

The Seattle Design Commission wants your ideas for Holding Patterns, interim uses for stalled project sites. We are seeking your concepts to transform the following types of stalled project sites around the city:

- holes in the ground
- surface lots
- ongoing construction above or below street level

Whether a concert space or a bumper car track, basketball hoops or a fleeting performance stage, from temporary to semi-permanent, wacky, practical or both, the Design Commission is welcoming any and all ideas. Artists, designers, non-profits,

businesses, developers, students, astronauts, everyone is invited to contribute ideas. Interdisciplinary teams are encouraged.

Deadline: Monday, May 24th, 2010

Your submission should include the following:

- a brief narrative including rationale, goal, purpose, program, and design intent the location, if specific (all city-wide locations are acceptable)
- a site plan and/or images that communicate your ideas
- Maximum of four 8.5" x 11" single-sided pages per site category

There will be a follow up implementation workshop for selected ideas, so please be prepared to make a two minute pitch for potential partners who are able to help make your ideas a reality.

**GOLDEN THREADS WEAVE A SACRED SPACE AT VA
PUGET SOUND FISHER HOUSE™**

Spring is a time of regeneration of new life and new beginnings. This spring, a ho-hum garden is being transformed into a vibrant, inspirational setting at the VA Hospital Fisher House™, Seattle, WA. The mission of The Fisher House™ program is to help the family members of active duty or military Veterans being treated in the VA Puget Sound Health Care System by providing extended overnight lodging that has the feel of a "home away from home." Since opening in September 2008, the VA Puget Sound Fisher House™ has served over 1100 families of Veterans and active duty military personnel. The Fisher House™ organization has become a place filled with honor, pride and great emotion, and thus a favorite charity of the Obama administration. This transformative garden project was sparked by the energy of the Friends of VA Puget Sound Fisher House™, (a 501(c) (3) nonprofit) working in collaboration with the University of Washington Dept. of Landscape Architecture Design/Build program. A design advisory committee, including Fisher House staff, guests, two other landscape design professionals and myself, reviewed the designs and worked with the students to formulate the final garden design. The new landscape is intended to soothe the souls and refresh the spirits of the military and Veteran families staying at Fisher House. The VA Puget Sound Fisher House™ is already a haven for the families who stay there and the inspiration for building a sustainable therapeutic garden

grew from the desire to extend that haven to the surrounding landscape, providing families with a place to rest, restore and heal. What makes the therapeutic garden at a hospital different from any other pleasing garden involves understanding what might help 'transport' people away from the medical process or the medical center. For example, knowing that some people grapple with the emotions of a difficult prognosis or treatment, the garden includes a spot for privacy. The concept design for the garden embodies the "healing journey." One enters the garden through a threshold of trees, leading to a central plaza. The focal point of the plaza is a "reflection" sculpture composed of metal bands weaving through a bed of ornamental grasses, suggesting the movement of wind. The plaza is surrounded by textured, colorful, and aromatic plants to delight the senses. A lushly planted rain garden, adjacent to the plaza, captures water on site. The rain garden gently embraces a circular pavilion softened by flowering vines. The pavilion is also marked by metal panels depicting a dove and olive branch motif, referencing peace and healing. An extended woodland restoration garden completes the "healing journey," symbolizing both spiritual and ecological reclamation. There is true magic at the Fisher House™. People check in as strangers but come together to create a community of understanding, empathy and support to become a new family. The therapeutic garden will be a new magical fabric at this place, weaved by the inspirational people who are part of this amazing facility.
